## Camp «Aglax» - history snapshots











Summer children ethno-ecological camp "Aglax" on Bering Island was founded in 2006. The idea was first suggested by Olga Petrovna Kuznetsova. She proposed to create a tent camp in Staraya Gavan (Old Harbor). The idea was implemented, and the camp in "Starukha" (the locals' affectionate nickname for the bay) was functioning until 2009. Starting from 2010 the ethno-ecological camp "Aglax" became an expedition camp. The camp's main goals are:

- To visit hard to get to places which can only be reached on foot by organizing multi-day hikes across the island;
- To study the nature of the island, in order to foster the appreciation of our homeland;
- To develop campers' resilience, independence and teamwork spirit;
- · To inspire students' creativity and aid their physical health








Lisinskaya Bay. At some point there was a seal rookery here. ATV trail is clearly visible in foreground.

Everyone, who did not already know how to do this learned to build fire, catch fish and identify birds and plants








Campers observed gray-crowned rosy finch, Eurasian wrans, and pechora pipit. A juvenile Eurasian wran even flew into our cabin.




























Bay Tolstyi Cape

Peregrebnaya Bay. We spent three very busy days here. We studied the plants, identified invertebrate, participated in "Around the World" quest and in an educational game created by our expedition leader about the life of Aleuts at the time when fur trade was winding down.











Peregrebnaya Bay! Here we found an enigmatic orchid from North America -mbroad leaved twayblade (Listera convallarioides), which is an endangered specie from the Red Book of Kamchatka



We were getting up to the hubbub of kittiwakes. Mixed colonies of both kittiwake species occupied cliffs surrounding the bay. The most interesting for ornithologists are red-legged kittiwakes, which is listed in the Red Book of protected species.



Mayatnik Bay



It is not too far from here to Monaty Bay. But it is impossible to travel by the beach because of the rocky outcrops. In Mayatnik Bay we played a game called "Borrow an Island." We were lucky again! Here we found an American orchid - broad leaved twayblade and a rare fern — common moonwort (Botrychium lunaria).

It began as a drizzle and soon became a full force rain, which stayed with us all the way to Tolstyi.



It is pouring outside, but in Sergey Pasenyuk's little cabin we are rehearsing two rock operas "Two Geese and a Granny" and "Grasshopper sits in the Grass," while drying our clothes.

Tropics! Hurray!






